- 1. Move students to a safe area away from doors and 1. Announce to the building: windows; such as an interior hallway or wall.
 - A. Sit on the floor in a crouched position.
 - B. Knees to chest.
 - C. Hands and arms covering head and neck.

"Staff, weather alert. Take cover."

- 2. If the phone system is not working, office personnel will notify their assigned areas.
- 3. The principal or designee will monitor the weather.
- 4. Announce when it is safe to resume instruction.
- 5. Campus Administration will report the situation to others as necessary.

FLASH to BAND or The 30-50 Rule

- 1. Person sees the stroke of lightning. Count the seconds until you hear the thunder. For each five-second count, the lightning is one mile away.
- 2. For a 30-second count, the lightning is six miles away.
- 3. The National Lightning Institute and National Weather Service recommend evacuation to a safe structure at that time.
- 4. The distance to a safe facility and the number of persons involved in the outdoor activity will determine when you evacuate the area.
- 5. Wait a minimum of 30 minutes from the last nearby lightning strike (flash to bang count less than 30 seconds) before resuming activities.

If a person is struck by lightning, Administer CPR immediately, IF QUALIFIED. Get EMERGENCY help promptly.

All teachers, staff and office personnel should be aware of safety precautions during inclement weather.

- 1. Be aware of weather predictions before the outdoor activity. Monitor weather conditions on your mobile device.
- 2. Follow the public warning system.
- 3. Appoint someone in the office to monitor the weather.
- 4. Use the 30-30 rule (Flash-to-Bang) as a secondary precautionary system.
- 5. Suspend activity as needed.
